The Pass of Killiecrankie

The Battle of Killiecrankie (1st Jacobite Rebellion) took place in 1689 Nearby is the renowned Soldier's Leap, where a Government soldier escaped by jumping 55 metres across the river - and also the Trooper's Den, where the first shot of the Battle was fired Pupils may also see some remains of Generals Wade's military road, dating from the 1720s, and the impressive railway viaduct

The Battle of Killiecrankie, also referred to as the Battle of Rinnory by contemporaries, took place on 27 July 1689 during the First Jacobite Rising between a Jacobite force of Scots and Irish and those of the new Williamite government The Jacobites won a stunning victory but suffered heavy casualties, their commander, John Graham, Viscount Dundee, being killed in the final minutes

1689 July Battle of Killiecrankie British forces were defeated by Scottish Jacobites (Jacobite meant a supporter of the exiled Stuart King James II and his family from the Latin word Jacobus for James) 1690 July Battle of the Boyne Protestant English King William III of Orange defeated the Irish Catholics led by James II 1691 August William of Orange offered a pardon to all Jacobites in the

of Killiecrankie (27 July 1689) marked a crucial point in the evolution of Highland warfare The Jacobite clans under John Graham, Viscount Dundee (a Lowlander and kinsman of the great James Graham, Marquis of Montrose), routed a numerically superior Williamite force under Major-General Hugh MacKay of Scourie But Killiecrankie was a Pyrrhic victory for the Highlanders for two reasons: first
