Hallucinations, delusions and paranoia Due to changes in the brain, people living with dementia may sometimes experience hallucinations, delusions and/or paranoia Understanding the difference between these can be helpful A hallucination is a false perception of objects or events and is sensory in nature When individuals with Alzheimer's have a hallucination, they see, hear, smell

Causes, diagnosis and treatment of visceral hallucinations

Hallucinations Information for patients, relatives and carers It is quite normal for patients in ICU to have hallucinations (nightmares, delusions, fantasies) A hallucination is "feeling" something (seeing, hearing, smelling, touching, tasting) that seems to be real but that has been created by the mind Patients in ICU believe that the experience has happened to them though factually

hallucinations in these conditions tend to be associated with other sense modalities, either simultaneously (eg, seeing and hearing the hallucination) or on different occasions (eg, visual hallucinations interspersed with auditory hallucinations)

Indeed, it is something of a psychiatric axiom that visual hallucinations in schizophrenia never occur without auditory hallucinations, either

Rare effects of stroke

Hallucinations usually become less intense over time, and treatment depends on the cause Charles Bonnet syndrome can't be cured, but a person may be helped by treatment for their vision problems Medication can help some people, and reassurance or self-help strategies can assist a person living with the condition Hallucinations due to other causes may be treatable by medication

Hallucinations and delusions in Parkinson's

Hallucinations and delusions may be a side effect of Parkinson's medication But not everyone who takes Parkinson's drugs will experience them It depends on the exact type of medication, the dose and the person taking them Sometimes, the higher the dose of medication, the more chance there is of experiencing hallucinations In particular some people with Parkinson's can experience

hallucinations and distortion in the vision - known as Charles Bonnet syndrome A stroke can also cause someone to have problems with their vision They may experience central vision loss, visual field loss, eye movement problems and visual perception and processing issues Sometimes medications can cause or contribute to visual difficulties They include some drugs from the following

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
