The Exiled Court of James II and James III: A Centre of ...

FOLLOWING the Glorious Revolution of 1688-9, James II and the Stuart royal family lived in exile as the guests of Louis XIV at the Chateau de St-Germain-en-Laye, near Paris James II died in 1701 and was succeeded as king-in-exile by his son, James III The court of these two kings remained at St-Germain-en-Laye for well over 20 years, until James III was expelled ...

Jacobites who gathered around the king they had followed into exile When he came back from Ireland, James II and VII had to prepare for a longer exile than he had expected and, 'began to think of settling himself at Saint-Germains, and of modelling his family and way of living suitable to the pension of 600 000 livres a year, which he received from the court of France'[17] Already

The Bill of Rights 1689

1688-89, which culminated in the exile of King James II and the accession to the throne of William of Orange and Mary Its intentions were: to depose James II for misgovernment; to determine the succession to the Throne; to curb future arbitrary behaviour of the monarch; and to guarantee parliament's powers vis a vis the Crown, thereby establishing a constitutional ...

King James II, succeeded in exile by his son James III, had been deposed because he was Catholic Yet many of the Jacobites (ie the people who remained loyal to the Stuarts, and even followed them into exile) were Protestant What should be the attitude of the Catholic Church in Catholic countries towards Protestant Jacobites who, though heretics, sacrificed so much and ...

Key Players during the 1715 Jacobite Rising

James spent more than a third of his life in exile In 1648 he escaped the civil war in England, fleeing to The Hague and then Paris, and passing the next decade serving with distinction in the French and Spanish armies In 1660 the Stuarts were restored under James's brother Charles II Influenced by the lives of Catholics he met on the continent James gradually converted to ...

The Jacobite Rebellions (1689-1746)

King James II of England (James VII of Scotland) was deposed and fled the country to exile in France precipitating the Jacobite Rebellions in 1689-1716 and 1745-1746 22 Jan 1689 England's 'Bloodless' or 'Glorious' Revolution reached its climax when the British parliament invites Mary Stuart and Prince Willem III (William of Orange) to be joint monarchs 21 Apr 1689 Dutch ...

Key Players during the 1715 Jacobite Rising

James VIII (1688-1766) James, son of James VII by his second wife Mary of Modena, grew up in exile at the palace of Saint-Germain-en-Laye and was recognised by Louis XIV of France as king of England, Scotland and Ireland Meanwhile, acts were passed under William II to exclude James from the throne and secure the Protestant succession
