Is immigration a reason for Britain to leave the EU?

Britain's EU immigrants are a boon, not a burden They are young and more likely to be in work than Britons, and thus pay more in taxes than they take out in benefits and public services They do, however, push up housing costs - a problem Britain must confront Contrary to popular opinion, EU immigrants are far less likely to take up benefits than the British population 'Benefit

Understanding the economic impact of Brexit

The UK's exit from the EU marks a step-change in the country's economic relationship with the bloc The UK will be moving away from close integration and co-operation with its nearest neighbours, while potentially reopening the opportunity to negotiate trade deals directly with non-EU countries Many analyses have tried to estimate what effect Brexit is likely to have on the UK economy
