The Great Fire of London, 1666

The Great Fire of London started on 2 September 1666 and burnt down four-fifths of the city in four days The fire started in the baker Thomas Farynor's shop Farynor was baker to the king Farynor later claimed that he had put the fire out, but three hours later at 1am, his house was an inferno Luckily, Farynor and his wife and daughter and one of their servants escaped through a window

The Great Fire of London In the 1600s in the city of London, some people expected there to be a fire because: • houses were built very close together; • buildings were made from timber; • it had been a long hot summer so water reserves were low and everything was very dry At that time, there was also a terrible disease called the plague This was a disease that very few people survived

The Great Fire of London What happened? 6 [This is a tax record for August 1666 These people lived in Pudding Lane in London The numbers show the amount of hearths (fireplaces) in each person's house People who owned a house had to pay a hearth tax to the king They paid 1 shilling (5p) for each hearth This tax was collected twice a year Some people might stop up their fireplaces for part

the Great Fire of London from King William Street in 1890 Leadenhall Market After walking underneath London Bridge on the Thames Path, take the first left at the stone benches, where you will see St Magnus the Martyr St Magnus the Martyr on Lower Thames Street 3 Due to its location, next to the River Thames and near a major crossroads into the City, this church was a key storage area for fire

Great Fire of London Facts Year 2 -The Great Fire of London When and where did the fire start? The fire of London started in a bakery in Pudding Lane on 2nd September 1666 Why did the fire spread? It hadn't rained for months so the city was very dry In 1666, lots of people had houses made from wood which burns easily Houses were built too close together and there was no organized fire

The Great Fire of London swept through the central parts of the English city from Sunday, 2 September to Thursday, 6 September 1666 The fire gutted the medieval City of London inside the old Roman city wall It threatened but did not reach the City of Westminster, Charles II's Palace of Whitehall, or most of the suburban slums It destroyed 13,200 houses, 87 parish churches, St Paul's Cathedral, and most of the buildings of the City authorities It is estimated to have destroyed the homes of 70,000 of the city's 80,000...
